- 1) Obtain a copy of Machiavelli's *The Prince*. This may be purchased online or you can read it online at: www.gutenberg.org/files/1232/1232-h/1232-h.htm (start where it says "The Prince")
- 2) Read the following chapters:
 - 5, 6, 7, 9, 14, 17, 22, 23

It's fairly short and succinct, but Machiavelli details what it means to be a "good" leader. I think you will find some of his conclusions both interesting and controversial. After it was published, the book was outlawed in many parts of Europe for roughly 200 years.

Long Response

Answer the question below. Your answer will be scored on a rubric of 5 and will be based on the following criteria:

- 1) **Contextualization:** Describe the world that Machiavelli lived in. This should be done in your opening paragraph.
- 2) **Thesis:** One to two sentences at the end of your opening paragraph that makes an argument answering the question.
- 3) **Evidence:** (1st point) Give at least two specific pieces of evidence that supports your argument from *The Prince*. (2nd point) Give at least two more points of evidence from outside *The Prince*. This will require some additional research (this should be about the leader you chose).
- 4) **Analysis:** Have a structured argument that supports your thesis logically.

Prompt: Evaluate the extent to which a European leader of your choice used Machiavellian ideas in their ruling between 1450-2000.
